

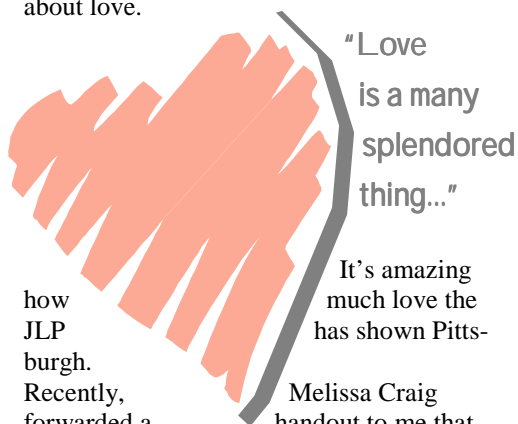

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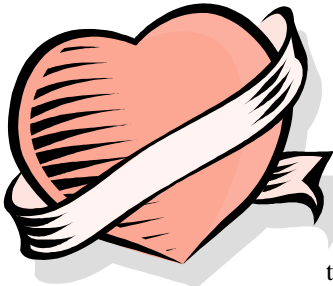

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Community Placement Spotlight

Two years ago, I spotted a blurb in our South Hills newspaper seeking volunteers for Pittsburgh Vision Services (PVS). Looking for volunteer work close to home, I called and set up an appointment to meet Nancy Shepis, the volunteer coordinator.

Nancy gave an overview of PVS, which was founded in 1959 by Monsignor Paul M. Lackner. The agency started as Catholic Guild for the Blind, which provided transportation and other social services to visually impaired Catholics. Father Lackner recognized the need for rehabilitation services and established the Greater Pittsburgh Guild for the Blind as a non-sectarian agency in Oakland. In 1961, the Guild accepted its first clients. The Bridgeville facility opened in 1968. From that time to 1990, more than 2,000 clients have been served in adjusting to blindness and vision loss.

Pittsburgh Vision Services offers low vision services, where clients are taught to use devices such as lights, special glasses, or magnifiers to adapt to diminished vision. The agency also provides community based training, in which a rehabilitation specialist works with clients in their own homes to provide training in mobility, daily living skills, and communication.

Comprehensive personal adjustment to blindness is an intensive rehabilitation program lasting 8-15 weeks. The client lives in the dormitory and receives instruction in daily living skills; orientation and mobility; communication skills; computer training; leisure time activities; and the use of low vision aids if applicable.

Personal and vocational training are also components of this training. Another service PVS offers is access technology center, which teaches skills that enable clients to work in educational and employment environments. In addition, PVS also has summer programs for teens.

Prior to doing any volunteer work, one must learn how to be a sighted guide to a visually impaired person. Nancy put a blindfold on herself and taught me how to assist a person with low or no vision around obstacles such as stairs, doors, and around hallways. Next, I donned the blindfold and was guided around the building. It was a very scary feeling, but an effective training tool. You learn firsthand the importance of describing surroundings and upcoming obstacles so a visually impaired person feels comfortable.

My volunteer work has focused on leisure time activities for clients in the comprehensive personal adjustment to blindness program. Every Tuesday afternoon, clients have the chance to participate in planned group activities such as bowling, an outing to the Duquesne Incline, the National Aviary, Sarris Candies (my favorite), games, or crafts. Some clients prefer to go to the grocery store or mall while others want to take a walk on a nature trail or go out to eat.

Leisure time has given me the chance to meet some truly remarkable

individuals. It’s amazing to see the progress clients make in areas such as mobility, confidence, and goals as they go through the program. Some have made a lasting impression--the man from the islands who sang hymns to me, the young woman who submitted scripts for her favorite television show, or the man who fell in love with a fellow client and married her. In addition to leisure time, I also volunteer for the motor pool, driving a client to a doctor’s appointment, bus station, airport, or to any activity outside of PVS.

PVS offers many more volunteer opportunities—escorting clients to cultural events, theater productions, movies, skiing, or taking teens camping or to Kennywood. Others might want to make tapings of books or become a teacher’s aide.

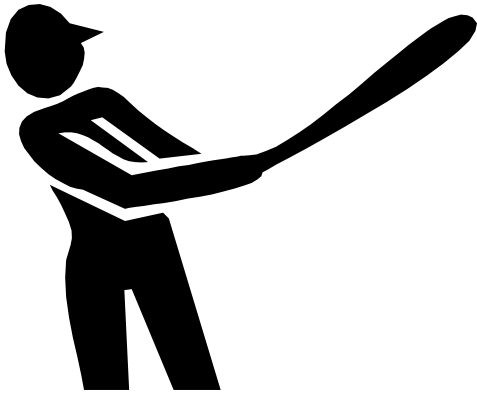

Placement — It's a Whole New Ballgame!

We are now winding down the 2003-2004 year. There are three important events coming up this Winter/Spring.

First: Spring Placement Interviews. Your Placement Advisor will be contacting you in February and March to conduct your spring interview. While not mandatory, we are asking each of you to participate in this process. Based on the results from the fall placement interviews, 60% of the actives participated and gave us some great feedback. We want to build on this success and achieve 100% participation.



Second: Placement Fair is March 10, 2004 from 6-7pm and precedes the March GMM. Placement Fair and the GMM is a required event for actives and provisionals. Your placement advisor will be discussing the upcoming Placement Fair with you during your spring interview. If you have not had an opportunity to discuss your 2004-05 placement interests with your placement advisor, now is the time to do so. We want to help you have a great start to the 2004-05 league year and it all starts with your placement. We recommend the following tactics for you to have a successful placement:

- Review your Placement interests with your Placement Advisor or Sue Duris-McMurdy, Placement Director
- Review the Placement Manual
- Communicate with either the Chair or member of the committee you are considering next year to get a bird's eye view of the committee, its structure, what it does, and what you should expect -Provisionals: meet with your Provisional Advisor to plot out a plan for your first placement as an active member

The Placement Committee will have placement manuals available by the February GMM. You may get your placement manual via your placement advisor, the web site, or via the e-mail blast.

Third: our grand party to celebrate our success in 2003-04 is the Annual Meeting, which will be held on June 2, 2004. Among other things, we will recognize new Gold Actives and new Sustainers. Any active that has contributed five years of active service to the Junior League is eligible for Gold Active status. Any eligible active that is interested in going Sustaining must notify Melissa Craig in writing with ccs: to Sue Duris-McMurdy, Placement Director, and their Placement Advisor by April 1, 2004.

Lastly, as an active, you are expected to fulfill your membership requirements by May 31st. Your placement advisor should be contacting you to ensure that you are on track with your requirements. If you have any questions or issues regarding requirements, please contact your Placement Advisor or myself as soon as you can so that we can resolve your requirements questions and concerns as promptly as possible.

Placement — Fast Five Qs

Q: How do I take a Leave of Absence?

A To request a Leave of Absence (LOA), notify Sue Duris-McMurdy, Placement Director, in writing, with ccs to your Placement Advisor, Committee Chair, and Melissa Craig, Corresponding Secretary. An active member in good standing may apply for an LOA from one to six months. A member on LOA is expected to fulfill all financial and fund raising obligations to the league including the sale of tickets and any quota required by fundraisers and the Wear After Shop and attend the annual Placement Fair. It will not be necessary for this member to fulfill the Wear After Shop shift or any additional shifts that would be necessary to the rest of the general membership. During the leave, the member is not obligated to attend any placement or committee meetings or the general membership meetings with the exception of the above noted.

Q: What do I do if I change my: name, address, e-mail address or telephone number or I want to change my membership status (transfer out, resign in good standing, reinstate)?

A Notify your Placement Advisor in writing, with ccs to Sue Duris-McMurdy, Placement Director and Melissa Craig, Corresponding Secretary.

Q: What do I do if I need to take maternity leave?

A Notify Sue Duris-McMurdy, Placement Director, in writing, with ccs to your Placement Advisor, Committee Chair, and Melissa Craig, Corresponding Secretary. Maternity Leave is automatically granted upon request for a period of 12 weeks. While on maternity leave a member is expected to fulfill all financial obligations to the League, including ticket sales, and any quota required by fundraisers and the Wear After Shop. The member will be responsible for her Wear After Shop shift. It will not be necessary for the member to fulfill any additional shifts re-

quired of the General Membership that fall within the 12-week Maternity Leave. The member will not be obligated to attend General Membership meetings but must attend the Placement Fair, during the 12-week maternity leave. Active members may extend the leave by requesting a Leave of Absence.

Q: Why are the fall and spring interviews so important?

A All active members should meet either face-to-face or via telephone with their Placement Advisor in the fall and the spring to provide feedback regarding their league experience, interest in any leadership opportunities, and to determine placement(s) (yes, you can have more than one placement!!) that would be a good fit and which you would enjoy. Your input will help make the JLP better.

Q: How can I improve my league experience?

A Be an active member and keep in touch with your Placement Advisor. Ask your Placement Advisor questions and provide as much feedback as you can so we can help you devise a program that is right for you, and one that meets your needs and interests.

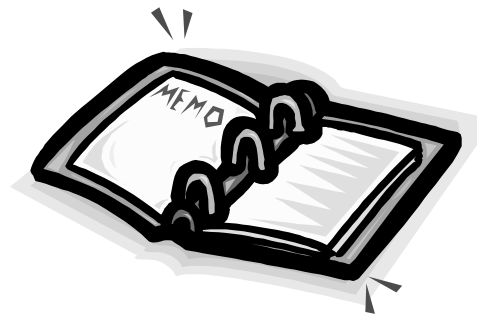
