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KaBOOM! Selected As New Signature Project

Who says a Signature Project has to be hard work? Not the Junior League of Pittsburgh! This year's membership has chosen to put the emphasis on play by selecting KaBOOM! as our new three-year Signature Project. The JLP and KaBOOM!, in conjunction with community partners, will build three playgrounds over the next three years.

KaBOOM! is a national nonprofit organization that envisions a great place to play within walking distance of every child in America. KaBOOM! has been in operation for over a decade and has used its innovative community-build model to construct over 890 new play-

grounds and skate parks and renovate 1,500 others nationwide.

KaBOOM! will assist the JLP in selecting a community partner (focusing predominately on low-income neighborhoods) who will be responsible for the future maintenance and upkeep of the playground after the build. Once the partner is selected, a Design Day will be scheduled in which children from the local community will assist the JLP and community partner in choosing the equipment that will go into their new playground. The Build Day will take place 10-12 weeks after the design has been confirmed and the playgrounds will be constructed by volunteers from both the JLP and

the community in a modern take on an old-fashioned barn raising. KaBOOM! will provide the playground equipment, project management and construction expertise for the Build Day. The project budget also has allocated \$5,000 per year for the JLP project committee to plan community events and activities to be held in the newly built playground.

KaBOOM! has successfully collaborated with the Junior League in the past. On March 31, 2006, the Junior League of Birmingham built a great new playground at Avondale Elementary School in Birmingham, Alabama, which

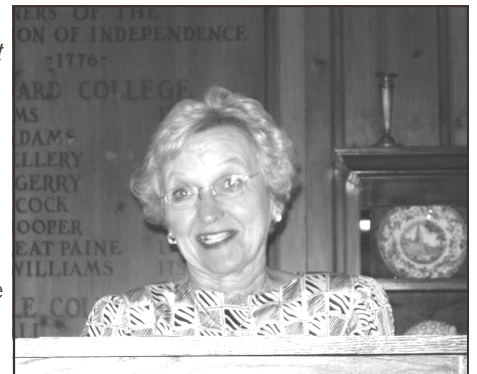
Anne D. Johnston Award Recipient Exemplary Volunteer

One of the hallmarks of the Junior League is the training received through each and every placement.



Through my placement this year, I've had the opportunity to attend terrific Association of Junior League International (AJLI) trainings. It is very inspiring to think there are 293 other groups of women in four countries working to make their communities better, too. Together we *are* changing the world. As the AJLI secretary went through roll by decade, she would give highlights of what the leagues were doing at that time. Miss Helen W. Leovy from Pittsburgh was the AJLI president in 1938-1940.

One of the plenary speakers was Picabo Street, the U.S. Olympic gold medalist. She shared a lesson learned during her career training for the Olympics. You *can* learn from someone who is wrapped in a package you may not like. There was a woman on her team that she did not like, but she learned how to work with her for the betterment of the entire team. They worked on common goals and as a result came out on top.

As you wrap up the past year and prepare for a new one in the JLP, be proud of what you have accomplished. Remember: you are a member of the team in Pittsburgh and the Association. I encourage you to visit the AJLI website to see what your teammates are doing and what they have to offer to improve your placement.

And finally, thanks to my teammates Lynne, the Board, and all the JLP members for welcoming me back to active status and giving me the opportunities to learn and grow through personal interactions, meetings and trainings. League, which she so loved, is so special; it allows one to value a person through direct involvement and service.

When I reflect on my League experience... so many faces and friends come to mind, many of whom are past recipients of the Anne D. Johnston award and, sadly, some who are no longer with us. Of course, back then, we were sharing books such as I'm O.K., You're O.K. and Stop the World, I Want to Get On, while today the books on our shelves are entitled, Brain Maintenance and How to Delay Dementia ... and Aleve has become our best friend!

Since most of you didn't know Anne, I'd like to take a minute to share two of my favorite memories. Anne had more hours in her day than most people, and she used every one of

them. At first, I was intimidated by her ability to "self-propel," but the more I got to know her, the more immense was my

admiration. Some time, I hope you'll read of her accomplishments in the "gray" book. They are true! When I became provisional chair, Anne requested that I develop a course for a new provisional in our class whose husband and she were being transferred to Belgium for several years. Because of the age requirements back then, had she not completed her course in that year, she would not have been able to be a League member when they returned. So, the Pittsburgh League produced its first "distance learning" course without computers... even with a component of thrift shop hours at a little, not-for-profit, resale shop in Brussels. Anne knew it was possible and entrusted us to make it happen!

Another memory was when Anne and I teamed up to update "Allegheny Adventures" so that it could again be taken into the area schools. So many exciting things had

happened in the city since the original script had been written. We worked together from one home to the other and took pictures throughout the City of new landmarks and wrote about new milestones. In between we'd talk and talk...even began to share printed sermons from our respective churches, some of which I still treasure. One day, at Anne's home, an enormous semi-trailer arrived. I followed Anne downstairs as she lifted the garage door and carton after carton of Girl Scout cookies...for the entire Fox Chapel area...were unloaded into the Johnston game room...until no inch of space was visible. I was overwhelmed just looking at them but Anne laughed and said that the boxes would all be distributed in a week or so.

I am deeply honored and humbled by being selected to receive this award. My thanks to Cookie Roberson and the Board of Recognition for this honor. And my thanks will always be to Anne D. Johnston, who established the

example! But enormous gratitude goes to each one of you, Active members, who give so much of your time, talent and dedication to the League and the community. You are the ones who move the League forward to make its mark in our community.

The League has evolved over these years...with change and flexibility still being its hallmarks. Twenty-five years ago, we were just beginning to respond to the growing number of members in the work force. "Professional" members were almost a division unto themselves but...slowly... sometimes, all too cautiously...meetings began to be scheduled to permit more interaction of the total membership...and great were the benefits...as one can see from your interaction this evening.

As Eleanor Roosevelt said, "Once you cease to contribute to society, you begin to die." Thank you ALL for making the Junior League of Pittsburgh live on!

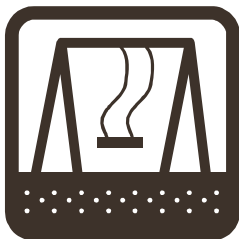

You should be able to obtain clearance right away. However, if there is a problem, it could take several weeks to get results. So volunteers should apply as soon as possible. There is a \$10.00 fee for each, a credit card is needed for the criminal check and a money order for the child abuse clearance.

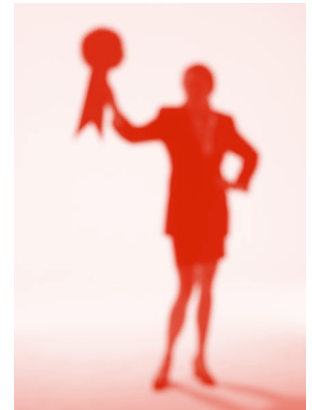

In March of 2006, the ad-hoc committee proposed to the Board of Directors that the Diversity Committee be made a standing committee to continue the work started in the 2005-2006 league year. This motion was passed by the Board and the General Membership at the Annual Meeting in May 2006.

As per our Standing Rules:

The committee will have a chair who will report to the Strategic Development Director. The committee shall be open to League members of all membership classes and shall be considered a second placement. The committee will develop, implement and manage an ongoing diversity plan to accomplish the League's diversity goals as set by the Strategic Development Committee and in conjunction with the League's Strategic Plan.

The committee will then make recommendations to the Membership Development Committee and the Placement Committee to increase and manage diversity within the League. Whenever possible, the committee shall include at least one member from the Placement Committee, Membership Developed Committee and the Strategic Development Committee.

The new standing committee will work with the recommendations of the student group to determine which recommendations are appropriate for the JLP and how we can promote diversity in our membership going forward. This is an exciting opportunity for any Active or Sustaining member of the League to become involved with shaping our future. Dear Sustainers,

I have always thought that it would be nice to have a monthly commitment with fellow sustainers followed by lunch! To that end, there is an organization that could really use our help, Global Links.

Global Links is a Pittsburgh based non-profit founded in 1989. They collect left over medical supplies and medicines (which would have been thrown away) from our hospitals, centralize these supplies, sort and repackage them and ship them to more than 140 hospitals throughout the developing world. Last year alone, they collected 34.5 tons of supplies and provided \$13 million of medical aid. This organization is run with only seven salaried full-time and seven part-time employees. The balance of the work is accomplished with volunteers. This is the area where we could really help. This is a tremendous organization that truly impacts lives.

Millie Ryan has agreed to help me in this venture. We have chosen the second Thursday of every month and are now on the calendar of Global Links starting in September. PLEASE consider joining us! We would love for you to come once, twice or every month. Not only will we be helping a worthy cause, but forging new friendships as well. I realize that there are many of you who work.
